Why do storms have names?

10 years ago the UK Met Office decided to start giving storms names, hoping it would make people more aware of them and how dangerous they can be. They also thought it would be easier to follow the progress of a storm on the TV, radio or social media if it had a name.

The public can suggest storm names and the most popular names are made into a list and may be used. Not all storms will be big enough to get names, only those expected to cause significant damage. The UK storms will take it in turns to be girl or boy names. Sometimes the UK will be hit by storms from other countries and then the storm will keep the name the first country gave it to avoid confusion.

Fireworks: Safety Tips

It is soon New Year's Eve, a time associated with fireworks. Every year, thousands of people are injured badly enough to require medical treatment after fireworks-related incidents. Many of the injuries are to children and young adults. If consumer fireworks are legal to buy where you live and you choose to use them, be sure to follow the safety tips below:

- · Anyone using fireworks or standing nearby should wear protective eyewear
- Never hold lighted fireworks in your hands
- Never light fireworks indoors
- Only use fireworks away from people, houses and flammable material
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person
- Never ignite devices in a container
- Do not try to re-light or handle malfunctioning fireworks
- · Soak both spent and unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding
- · Keep a bucket of water nearby to fully extinguish fireworks that don't go off or in case of fire
- Never use illegal fireworks

What can I do to help homeless people in freezing conditions?

Winters can be extremely cold and it means people who are sleeping rough face even bigger dangers than usual. You may wonder what you can do to help people on the streets.

Stop to say hello and check they are ok. Being a friendly face and stopping to say hi and ask if they're ok can go a long way. If you'd like to help someone out by giving them something, it's always best to ask someone if they want your help first. Ask what they might need or like. This could be a warm drink or some hot food to help warm them up.

You could offer them some warm clothes such as gloves, hats and scarves or a blanket. See what you have at home and make sure they are in decent condition and truly warm. There may even be some cheap options in charity shops that you could offer to those sleeping rough near you.

If you are worried that someone is in immediate danger due to the cold weather, please call 999. Sleeping rough kills, be it from exposure, pneumonia or influenza, and someone may be sicker than you think. Look out for signs of hypothermia such as shivering, memory loss, slurred speech, fumbling hands and drowsiness. It is better to be safe than sorry.

WEIRD COMPETITIONS

9.0 <u>H</u> Many of the world's most popular sports competitions were invented in Britain. The current rules of football were written in Cambridge, the modern version of tennis was invented in Birmingham, and cricket is, of course, also a British invention. But that isn't all; badminton, golf, curling, squash, and table tennis are all sports created in the UK.

9.1 _____ Are the British really that good at inventing great sports, you might be wondering? In fact, the answer is yes. While some are played only in certain places, others have become popular all over the world. Take football, for example. Kicking a filled pig's bladder sounds very weird; but now, football has about 3.5 billion fans and 250 million players across 200 countries.

9.2 Many will say that competition is an essential part of life. Sports are a popular way to exercise and a good way to meet new friends. They can unite people from different backgrounds, give people a cause to cheer for, and even support a healthy lifestyle. Each country may have its own favourite sport, but regardless of whether these countries are rich or poor, the appeal of sports is universal.

Then take turns hitting someone else's conker, and simply gain points whenever your opponent's conker breaks. The competition, which is held on Boxing Day every year in a village near Cambridge, dates back to the 17th century. Even though the barrels remain empty throughout the match, it is no easy task to keep control of a barrel at speed on uneven ground.

Enjoy life and stay alive in Death Valley

Blogger Amanda McEwan offers advice as to what to see in Death Valley and how to stay safe there.

Death Valley might not be on Time Out's list of Top 20 Destinations in the USA but, as a place of spectacular contrasts, it is definitely worth a visit. While summer temperatures can rise to more than 50°C and it receives less than 5 centimetres of rain per year, the mountain peaks are snow-covered in winter. On the rare occasions when it rains, fields of wildflowers suddenly appear ⁵ in the desert. Lush oases support tall palm trees and pools full of tiny fish.

Even in the more inhospitable areas, a great diversity of wildlife has adapted to survive the difficult conditions. For example, some desert animals have evolved to need less water than we would normally expect. Kangaroo rats do not drink water their entire lives, instead absorbing water from the seeds they eat. Some animals spend a lot of time in cool underground burrows, while others ¹⁰ are mostly active at night.

You will love exploring everything that Death Valley has to offer! Here are my two highlights:

• Visit Badwater Basin which, at 86 metres below sea level, is the lowest point in the USA. Take time to gaze at the high rocks and white salt flats that surround you – a beautiful wilderness. If you are there in March and April, you will see many of the park's 900 species of desert plants

¹⁵ in flower. Before going for a walk here, pour 1-2 litres of water over yourself to avoid heatstroke and dehydration.

- Stop at some of the spectacular viewpoints in Death Valley, such as Dante's View and Zabriskie Point. Sunrise and sunset are outstanding times to visit, but the views are other worldly at any time of day and some wonderful mountain hiking paths begin here. Just remember
- ²⁰ water and sun protection and, if you are driving, also make sure you start the day with a full tank.
